*BASF Corporation's Policy Statement*

BASF Corporation is firmly against any form of forced labor, human trafficking, and slavery. BASF will not condone any type of this prohibited, unlawful conduct by its employees, suppliers, vendors, or other business partners.

As set forth in BASF's Global Code of Conduct, we are "committed to the abolition of all forms of child and forced labor." ([Global Code of Conduct](#)) BASF, moreover, seeks to ensure that the conduct of all BASF employees is consistent with internationally agreed upon standards of human rights as well as core labor and social standards.

BASF requires that its suppliers and vendors comply with all applicable laws, including those relating to labor practices and forced labor. Accordingly, BASF's Supplier Code of Conduct reflects our expectation that suppliers fight forced labor and child labor. ([Supplier Code of Conduct](#)). If BASF becomes aware of credible information about any form of forced labor, human trafficking or slavery by its suppliers or vendors, it will conduct a thorough investigation and/or audit.

BASF Corporation provides training to its employees, who have direct responsibility for supply chain management, on the topics of forced labor, child labor, human trafficking and slavery. This training focuses on mitigating risks within the supply chain of products.
