

ITOCHU FIBRE LIMITED (“IFL”)
Slavery and Human Trafficking Statement for Financial Year 2017

This statement is made pursuant to Section 54 of the UK Modern Slavery Act 2015 and constitutes IFL’s slavery and human trafficking statement for the financial year ending on 31 March 2018 (the “Financial Year 2017”).

1. The Company's Structure and Our Supply Chain Complexity

IFL is a wholly owned subsidiary of ITOCHU Corporation (“ITC”), a Japanese *sogo shosha* which is engaging in trading of products such as textiles, machinery, metals, minerals, energy, chemicals, food, general products, realty, information and communications technology, and finance, as well as business investment in Japan and overseas. IFL is engaging in trading of pulp and paper products as well as business investment in Finland.

2. Our Policy on Modern Slavery and Human Trafficking

ITC is committed to ensuring that no modern slavery or human trafficking exists in its supply chains or in any part of its business. ITC is participating in the United Nations Global Compact and applies the concepts of the United Nations Guiding Principles on business and human rights. ITC’s existing policies contain provisions aimed at ensuring that there is no slavery or human trafficking in any part of its global business or supply chain.

IFL, as a member of ITC group company, recognises these policies. IFL has been doing business in accordance with the principles under these policies.

3. Development of the Policy and Guideline

In Financial Year 2017, IFL promoted (i) its own written policy (the “Policy”) to ensure that there is no slavery or human trafficking in its supply chains (rather than referring to ITC’s policy) and (ii) its own written guideline (the “Guideline”) to explain IFL’s position aimed at slavery and human trafficking issues in its supply chains.

In accordance with the Policy, IFL sent or handed out the Guideline to all major relevant suppliers to secure their recognition of its position that there is no slavery or human trafficking in its supply chain policy.

4. Training

Further to the in-house training session held in the previous financial years, IFL conducted similar session again in Financial Year 2017 to our relevant employees. Such session was made to spread their further understanding toward the relationship between business activities and human rights. It was referred in this training session that slavery and human trafficking should be banned from our supply chains.

5. Further Steps

Following the review of Financial Year 2017 and in accordance with the Policy, IFL intends to take the following steps:

- 1) to regularly educate our employees and promote their awareness of ITC's policy;
- 2) to continue providing the Guideline to all relevant suppliers;
- 3) to request the relevant supplier to take remedial action when discovering a case that does not comply with the Guideline; and
- 4) to reexamine its business dealing with such suppliers if progress has not been achieved after such request.;

This statement was approved by the board of directors of IFL.
